The 5th Grade teachers will work with students and their families to support student success in reading and math. Some of our key connections with families will be:


 Teachers will provide guided reading instruction as well as conferencing and setting goals with teacher regarding the Reading Inventory score.

 Teachers will provide constructed response questions for students to explain their math thinking in journals.

At Home

LCES parents joined staff to develop ideas about how families can support student success in Reading and Math


 Review study guides and vocabulary with my child as well as monitoring that they are reading for 15 minutes every night.


 Practice multiplication and division math facts until mastered with my child.



5th Grade Students

Students joined staff and parents to develop ideas about how they can succeed in school. Students shared the following ideas:

 Students will practice explaining their thinking in math through journal writing as well as collaborative work.
